These quilts would need to be finished and delivered to the shelter at the beginning of November in time for their opening. The guild board and membership welcomed this challenge knowing that our quilts would be used to help women and their families towards overcoming hardships and difficulties from the outside world and these quilts would send the message: YOUARE WARM, YOUARE SAFE, YOU ARE LOVED.

Community Outreach is the common thread that runs through our guild and the reason why we quilt and why there is a profound connection to others whenever we pick up cloth, needle and thread. Special thanks to so

many guild members that guided each of our beautifully donated quilts through this process from creating and designing each quilt, sewing tops & backing, adding batting and quilting each of these twin quilts (many done by our long-arm quilters) and finally binding each quilt and adding one of our labels. Truly a labor of LOVE... What an exciting time for the guild with the opening of the *Shuman Heart House* this past week. On November 3^{rd,}*Fatima, Joan* and I made our second and final delivery

of 40 twin size, quilts, 2 crib quilts, and a quilt to hang in their entrance, to the *Shuman Hearthouse* just in time for their open house on November 4th.

The shelter staff had been working hard to set up the facility, the 16 individual rooms and 4 family rooms that included one of our donated quilts at the foot of each bed, carefully folding each quilt to show the *MPQG* labels sewn to the back of each quilt. As part of an individuals stay, they will be allowed to select a quilt that will be theirs to take with them when they leave the shelter.

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
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The Sewing Machine Is Really A Time Machine

hat's the question most often asked when we show a quilt to someone? I will venture to guess it is not "where did you learn to do that" nor "did you design that yourself." It's not "what does it cost to make a quilt" nor "what kind of machine do you use?" It's this question: "how long did that take you?" It's a question about time.

And it's been the core question about sewing machines since the beginning of, well, since the beginning of their time. The first household sewing machines were made in 1845 and could sew 250 stitches a minute. The cost was \$300.00, or \$8,000 in today's money, and could sew faster than five humans doing handwork. Prior to that, sewing machines were so rare, having them was pivotal in the winning of wars. That's right, the French Army was better armed, not with weapons but with uniforms. Later the American Civil War hinged on the northern Union soldiers having machine made uniforms from several industry hubs while the Confederates had no factories and used hand sewn clothes which were easily tattered.

Sewing machines are considered the major factor in the Industrial Revolution, with rioting tailors slowing sewing factory work for decades. But it was for naught as the proliferation of factory sewing allowed for one of the greatest boosts in the economy ever known with commoners able to buy cheap clothing. Machine sewing was the first job for women to work outside the home, boosting family income to about \$2000 a year. Thus, store bought clothing was a sign of increased wealth and decreased time at home.

While the treadle machines of 1856 cost \$125 (\$3,470 today), by 1902 sewing machines were cheap enough to be purchased by the common citizen. Now it was seen as a sign of increased leisure time to have clothes made at home. By 1951, a \$350 machine represented 10% of the household income of \$3,000 a year. Store bought clothes started to increase in cost, leaving those children who went to school in homemade clothes as walking advertisements that their family was struggling financially.

Back and forth it went, sometimes signaling wealth by having a sewing machine and other times suggesting a family was poor. Sometimes alerting others to the fact that one has leisure time to sew for pleasure, other times suggesting a one income family. We can see this back and forth mimicked in many modern conveniences.

For hundreds of years, only the very rich could encase their food in gelatin as it required kitchen staff devoting days to rendering and clarifying collagen from animal bones. Thus jellied dishes were the food of elite households with indentured servants. Around the same time as sewing machine proliferation, powdered gelatin came on the scene so that it was available to anyone -- but only to anyone with one more thing. A refrigerator. At the church social, it was a sign of significant wealth to bring jello molds as it told everyone you had a refrigerator. Once everyone had a fridge, jello came out of fashion and suggested you were a lazy cook and jello molds were the stuff of poor and backwards families.

And that, in a very hard to fathom nutshell, is why people ask you how long it takes to make a quilt. They are distancing themselves from you, not by admitting they don't have the skill or can't afford a machine or fabric, but by **time**. They don't have the time. Now, no leisure time is a measurement of the American success story. You can't win. So here's my answer when they ask me how long it takes to do my art, books and quilts: I simply say, "I have no idea."

She laughed and said home-baked desserts were always welcome and that she'd make extra deviled eggs.

Cranberry-Orange Bread

Makes one loaf bread or 12 regular muffins Preheat Oven to 375° F. Prepare bread loaf pan or muffin tin: either coat well with butter and flour or use bakers spray.

Ingredients:

- 1 cup All-Purpose (AP) flour (+ 1 T for coating fresh cranberries, if using)
- 1 cup almond flour
- 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 2 cups fresh or frozen (defrosted) cranberries or 1 1/4 cups dried cranberries
- 1/2 cup (1 stick) unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup dark brown sugar
- 2 large eggs
- 2 tsp pure vanilla extract
- 1 tsp almond extract
- zest of 1 orange (or lemon)
- 1/2 cup half & half cream or plain yogurt

A few weeks ago, I invited my friends from Back Porch Fabrics up to see my new studio and I made this recipe as a loaf. It got rave reviews and at least four requests to share the recipe, which I adapted from the Cranberry Orange Muffins recipe at https:// addapinch.com. I hope you enjoy! See you December 4th!

Instructions:

- Sift together the dry ingredients (flours, 1. baking powder and salt) into a medium bowl and set aside.
- In a separate bowl, toss the fresh (or 2. defrosted) cranberries with 1 T. of flour to coat; set aside. Skip this if using dried cranberries.
- 3. In a mixer, cream the sugars and butter together until well mixed. Add the two eggs, one at a time, beating well after each one. Then add the extracts and the zest until well mixed.
- Fold in half the dry ingredient mixture, 4. then the cream, then the remaining flour mixture. Stir until just combined. Be careful not to over mix at this point.
- 5. Gently fold in the cranberries until just combined.
- Pour mixture into prepared loaf pan or 6. scoop into muffin tin (don't overfill muffin wells). Bake until toothpick comes out clean: loaf bread takes about 50-60 minutes; muffins about 30 minutes. Let cool before you try to remove from the pan or tin. Best served slightly warm.

Community Quilt Needs

A lthough many of you like to control the whole creative process of the quilts you donate, some people only want to make the top. If that's you, or you want to quilt it yourself but can't afford to supply the batting and back, the Guild can provide batting and back. Again, many thanks for your creative generosity.

• *Tummy Time quilts* — approximately 36" square - can be rectangular or slightly larger. So, if you have a couple orphan blocks, add some fun borders and you'll make a baby happy.

• *Twin-sized quilts for the shelter* — Dimensions are approximately 65"-70" wide by 86"-90" long, enough to cover top and hang over sides of a regular twin bed. [Editor's Note: There will be on ongoing need for twin-sized quilts.]

• *Port and heart pillows* — the pattern for the heart pillow is on the website, as well as info on port pillows.

• *Cotton Neonatal 20*" *x 24*" *quilts* — You can tie them, machine quilt, or hand quilt them. Traditional, modern, or gender neutral — they all work! For more details, check with *Liz Rondelle*, <u>bukavugirl@aol.com</u>
